Winneconne's magical 2024 football season came to an end on Friday night.

A potent Baldwin-Woodville squad took the lead early and then held off the Wolves to claim a 40-16 victory in a WIAA Division 4 state semifinal at Medford High School.

The Blackhawks, champions of the Middle Border Conference, scored on their first three possessions to take a 22-0 lead less than a minute into the

Hintz Announces Candidacy for Winnebago County Executive

Wolves' postseason run ends with loss to Blackhawks

second quarter.

The Wolves were able to make a game of it after falling behind and it started with a little trickery.

Brody Schaffer was in punt formation on a fourth-and-3 from near midfield, but after taking the snap, he rolled to his right and fired a pass to Karter Hawthorne. Hawthorne caught the ball near the sideline and then sprinted past a couple of Blackhawk defenders for a 49-yard touchdown pass.

The Wolves trimmed the deficit to 22-8 when Schaffer hit Kaden Carder for the two-point conversion.

The Blackhawks answered with another touchdown before Winneconne notched its second score in as many drives.

The Wolves marched 66 yards in eight plays for the score, getting a key conversion on third-and-11 when Schaffer scrambled for 12 yards to the Baldwin-Woodville 9-yard line.

Two plays later, Schaffer found Ryan Quigley in the back of the endzone for a 5-yard touchdown pass, with Schaffer's conversion run leaving the Wolves trailing 28-16.

Winneconne had a chance to pull even closer before halftime, after forcing a Baldwin-Woodville punt with less than a minute to play in the half.

Keyed by a 42-yard pass from Schaf-


Whitford selected as District 4 Athletic Director of the Year One of 7 ADs recognized across the State of Wisconsin



fer to Quigley, the Wolves had the ball

at the Blackhawks 21-yard line with less than five seconds in the half. Schaffer dropped back to loft one into the end zone but was forced scramble. The junior quarterback wove his way through Blackhawk defense but was stopped two yards short of the goal line

by 12 at intermission.

Winneconne's defense opened the second half with a stop as Trey Zemke brought down the Blackhawks' Gavin Sell for a loss on fourth-and-1 to give the ball to the Wolves at their own 24yard line.

Winneconne marched to the Baldwin-Woodville 23-yard line before a couple of penalties put the Wolves behind the chains. On fourth-and-9, Schaffer was sacked, ending the drive

and giving the ball back to the Black-

Baldwin-Woodville responded with a touchdown drive to add to its lead late in the third quarter and the Blackhawks forced a pair of turnovers in the fourth quarter to help seal the win.

Schaffer had a huge night in the biggest game of the season for the Wolves.

The junior accounted for 399 of Winneconne's 404 yards of offense in the game. He finished with a season-high 258 passing yards, while completing 21-of-27 passes, while also racking up 141 rushing yards in the game.

The standout ends his season with 1,774 yards rushing and 31 touchdowns, while averaging 9.6 yards per carry. Schaffer also completed nearly 71 percent of his passes on the season and finished with 1,800 yards and 17 touchdowns.

Ryan Quigley was the Wolves' leading receiver on Friday with eight catches for 110 yards. Jack Quigley added five catches for 75 yards while Charlie Roubidoux chipped in four receptions.


Jace Nygaard led the Winneconne defense with 10 tackles, while Andon Lang had eight and Schaffer, Hawthorne, Oliver McAloon and Jesse Michaud each had seven.

Baldwin-Woodville, which lost in the state semifinals last season, will play Racine St. Catherine's for the Division 4 state title on Thursday at 7 p.m. at Camp Randall Stadium.

Veterans Day Celebrated

At its annual Veterans Day program, Winneconne Middle School paid tribute to our local military veterans, both past and present.

The middle school's band and choir performed a classic ensemble of patriotic favorites to honor the event, and even orchestrated a rousing combined number between the two groups which earned a hearty round of applause.

Army Combat Veteran Josh Janikowski, a current village board member for Winneconne, was the guest speaker for the program. Janikowski recalled the terrorist attacks during 9-11 while he was a sophomore at Winneconne High School—an event which inspired him to enlist and serve his country.

"I felt helpless at the time while I waited until June 24, 2002 to enlist in

the U.S. Army. When I enlisted, I felt a strong sense of pride and commitment and couldn't wait to begin doing my part in protecting our freedoms."

Janikowski shared that his military background taught him the values of self-accountability, self-discipline, and the importance of physical fitness, even giving a shoutout to Winneconne's track and cross-country programs for ensuring he was in great shape for basic training.

Janikowski was eventually deployed to Iraq for Operation Iraqi Freedom from 2004-05. Upon returning home, he served in the reserves until 2007 and later became an Army recruiter, honorably discharged in 2010.

"During my time in the military, I learned many hard lessons that shaped

who I am. I learned that this nation is, and always will be, worth fighting for. I learned that nothing good in life can be handed to you, you have to want it and work hard for it. I learned the value of teamwork, trust and perseverance, and respect for differences."

In closing, Janikowski shared this quote from an unknown source, "A veteran, whether active duty, retired, National Guard, or Reserves, is someone who at one point in his or her life wrote a blank check made payable to the United States of America for an amount of, up to and including their life"



Sports – Girls Basketball Preview

Young Wolves roster ready to contend in 2024-25

Troy Buelow has to remind himself sometimes that as talented as his 2024-25 Winneconne girls basketball roster is, it is a group that is extremely young and still learning how to play.

Sometimes, they remind him of that on their own.

"When we let them go live (in practice), we will see flashes of what they can do and how good they can be," Buelow said. "Then, about two seconds later I will be slapping my head like what were they thinking. We are still very young. We know there will be some growing pains so it's just a matter of being patient with them."

Although young – Buelow said the Wolves could have a lineup on the court with just sophomores and freshmen – a number of key players on this year's squad saw plenty of varsity minutes last year and played key roles in Winneconne's regional title win in the postseason.

Leading the list will be sophomores Grace Mitchell and Harper Neace, who were Winneconne's top two scorers last season.

Mitchell played the entire season on the varsity level and averaged 13.4 points per game, while leading the team in 3-pointers and free throws. She also led the team in steals and finished second in rebounds.

Neace was elevated to the varsity

squad after nine games last season and averaged 7.9 points and a team-leading 6.7 rebounds per game a year ago.

"Grace is a five-tool player and is an all-around, can-do everything player. She can shoot it. She can handle it. She can defend. She is getting stronger and putting it all together," said Buelow, who is taking over for Andrea Flease after previously serving as the boys varsity coach for eight seasons. "Harper is more of a post but handles the ball well and can play on the perimeter. Her strength is cleaning up the offensive glass and with her length on defense, making plays that way.

"Getting both of them back is great. Those two are going to be our horses that help us win quite a bit this year."

The duo will be leading the way for the Wolves, but certainly won't be the only players the Wolves will be counting on for contributions.

Sophomore Brooklyn Messerschmidt saw limited varsity action last year but is expected to take on a bigger role this season, while junior Jada Kaiser returns after logging a lot of varsity minutes last year along with Camille Braman – the lone senior on the roster – who played a key role last year for the

Buelow also has two freshmen on the varsity roster – Ari Reetz and Abigail Oleson – who are expected to be a part of the rotation. Even with the young roster last season, Winneconne won six of its final eight games – including three in the WIAA tournament – and saw its season end in a sectional semifinal loss to eventual state runner-up Xavier.

Buelow is hoping to build on that momentum the team had at the end of last season.

"Andrea had them improving every week. They hit their groove in the middle of the season and then got some favorable matchups in the regional and won the regional championship," Buelow said. "Obviously, the girls want to carry that momentum over and they are striving for more."

With such a young roster, there is definitely at least one eye on the future for this group.

However, Buelow also knows this team has the potential to do some special things this season and believes that the team is ready to have success.

"There are expectations when you win a regional championship and you hope to take that next step. So we're hoping that happens. We want to focus on this right now because they want to win right now and so do I," Buelow said. "I would be naïve to think that we aren't going to lose a game here or there, but as long as we learn from it for that next year that would be wonderful. Not only do we have goals for this year but they have some pretty big goals for the future."

One of the challenges for the Wolves will be in their own league as the East Central Conference, where the Wolves tied with Kewaskum for third last season, will again be tough.

Returning state qualifier Kettle Moraine Lutheran and perennial power-house Waupun finished tied atop the league last year and both return quality teams, while Buelow also believes that Plymouth should be much improved with some of the additions to their roster.

Still, he believes that Winneconne should be right there contending with the best.

"We were picked to take fourth in the conference. I'm not going to say that's not fair but that would be a disappointment for us if we finish fourth," Buelow said. "We want to be up in that top two range and if we can steal one from KML, maybe we can win this thing."

2024 Gun Deer Season Forecast

Here we go! The gun deer season is upon us - Nov. 23 to Dec. 1 will see

one of the largest peacetime militias take to the Wisconsin woods for the 9-day gun hunt. The anticipation is always high. For me, the preparation, the shopping, the packing, the meal plan-

ning, and the travel are half the fun.

This season will find our crew in the hamlet of Iola once again, with the usual suspects, at the same great cabin. Lu the lab even gets to make the trip. There will be some great food, a couple cocktails at places we see once a year, some dice, cards, and other games. Everything a great Wisconsin deer camp should have.

We know better than to pin all our hopes on what is hanging on the meat pole (the swing set out back). It's the vibe, the camaraderie, the same old jokes, and the new ones that will be repeated over the next decade. Take it all in; it passes way too quickly.

The DNR has a few pointers worth mentioning to make for a great hunt:

T – Treat every firearm as if it is loaded.

A – Always point the muzzle in a safe direction.

B - Be certain of your target, what's

before it and what's beyond it.

K – Keep your finger outside your trigger guard until you are ready to shoot.

Also, don't shoot before or after legal hours and wear blaze orange or fluorescent pink. Hunters are required to wear at least 50% blaze orange/fluorescent pink from the waist up. Any hats or hoodies must also be at least 50% blaze orange/fluorescent pink. The DNR encourages the non-hunting public and their pets to wear the same colors during the gun deer season if they plan to recreate on public land. I see a lot of guys with the right outerwear, only to pull a camouflaged backpack over half of them. Stay visible.

With this year's season starting further removed from the peak of breeding activity, fewer deer may be on the move. Still, there is reason for optimism, as other factors like colder temperatures and snow cover could create excellent conditions. Also, last year's mild winter means fawn production and antler development will likely be better than in recent years.

Register Your Harvest

All harvested deer must be registered electronically by 5 p.m. the day after the deer is recovered. Online with GameReg; by phone at 1-844-426-3734; or electronically at a participating in-person registration station.



They burned the mortgage!

Back in November 2013 after approximately 1 year of dedicated fundraising, the Winneconne Area Assistance Center (WAAC) was able to officially pay off its mortgage on the Baptist Church they purchased on South 3rd Street and release itself from significant operational debt.

The church was purchased from Roger Giddings for \$50,000 after WAAC had to vacate its longstanding pantry location within Winneconne Elementary School.
