Winneconne to send trio of runners to state meet



Winneconne Unveils RO System

Village's Landmark Reverse Osmosis System one of only three RO membrane systems statewide By Becky LaDue

In what can be deemed a huge step forward in quality of life for the Village of Winneconne, its new Reverse Osmosis water treatment system was fully unveiled to the public on Thursday, Oct. 24.

Key players on the nearly 14-year project from the discovery of the original water system failing to meet necessary standards, to today's state-of-the-art RO installation-joined with village officials for a ribbon cutting and tour of the Well #2 facility which houses the gleaming new water purification structure.

When the village was faced with DNR regulation violations of MCL exceedances of Gross Alpha particulate activity in its well system, further water analysis by the State of Wisconsin revealed a high percentage of Uranium 235—requiring a significant removal rate.

in removing the Uranium, bringing the village into compliance, while also providing Radium removal and hardness reduction. Testing also confirmed there would be no need for either iron or manganese pretreatment if unoxidized iron was put through the system.

With a path chosen, it took the village several years to secure the financing for the new water treatment system (a Harn RO system out of Sarasota, FL) along with other hurdles to be faced.

The project involved many complexities given two well sites; one stationed on Meadow Lane (Well #2) and another on the other side of the river (Well #1). Rather than installing an RO system at both sites, 3,200 ft of 8" transmission watermain was constructed with directional boring for the 1,150 ft. Wolf River crossing. Once achieved, clean drinking water can now successfully flow from one side of the

village to the other. All the village's raw water passes through the RO purification system and is then deposited in a huge storage tank

team being bumped up a division because of its recent run of success. This is the first year that the WIAA has instituted the policy.

The competitive plan, which affects all WI-AA-sanctioned sports, awards points for postseason success around the sectional and state levels of competition. When a program accumulates enough points over a three-year span, they are elevated to the next highest division for postseason competition the following year.

The Winneconne boys, the state runner-ups in Division 2 last year, had qualified for the state meet as a team every year since 2018.

Winneconne cross country coach Kraig Western said he knew after last season the boys would be competing in Division 1 this year. The Wolves' appeal to the WIAA to remain in Division 2 was denied.

"As a coach, there is only one wat to pitch it to the team – let's go out and put forth our best effort and see where it falls," Western said in the days leading up to Saturday's sectional meet. "I give the kids a lot of credit. They haven't said too much. There is only one way to approach and that's the way the guys did it."

Winneconne represented itself well against the highest level of competition at the sectional meet, which was held on Saturday in Stevens Point. The Wolves finished fourth as a team accumulating 148 points to finish behind Division 1 powerhouses Stevens Point (19) and Neenah (62), with Kimberly taking third with 95 points. Winneconne was actually the only team out-

Winneconne was actually the only team outside of Stevens Point to place two runners in the top 10 as Aberle finished fifth and Wenzelow took seventh in the field of 82 runners.

Western said the biggest obstacle in moving up a division is simply the numbers in the programs the Wolves were competing against.

Winneconne's boys team had 19 runners this season according to Western, which was less than half of what some of the teams they were com-

peting against drew from.

But the size of the Division 1 teams was a lot for the Wolves to overcome.

"You look at Neenah and Stevens Point and their numbers hover around 50, so they have twice as many kids that they are pulling from (to make a team). Simple math will tell you who has the higher likelihood of finding five," Western said. "That's the reality of it and that's why moving up a division is so hard."

Winneconne finished ahead of more than a handful of Division 1 programs at the sectional meet, but it's the quality within the quantity of those powerhouse programs that made the competitive hill too steep to climb.

"There are plenty of D1 teams out there we could beat. Just being in Division 1 doesn't make you great," Western said. "But when you run into those great Division 1 teams who are well coached and the kids work hard and it's tough."

The competitive balance plan does affect all WIAA-sanctioned sports, however, with the format of the cross country postseason it does hit the sport in a different way.

"We get 16 teams to state where (many sports get four), so more cross country teams can accrue points. They just took a paint brush and said everybody is going to use the same point system," Western said. "A team that finishes 12th at state three years in a row should never be moved up a division. That's just crazy."

Western does believe there will be changes to the system moving forward, however, this year's athletes won't benefit from any adjustment to the system.

"I think there will be changes but you are playing with kids' athletic careers. You only get to go through high school once," Western said. "I'm proud of our kids and the approach they took but I think someday they will look back and say we kind of got ripped off."

Behind Aberle and Wenzelow, the Winneconne boys other scoring runners consisted of Silas Sarbo placing 33rd and Johan Jacobson and Merrick Heise taking 51st and 52nd, respectively.

Yetter and the Winneconne girls ran its sectional meet on Friday in Waupaca and came within a whisker of sending its entire team to the state meet.

The Wolves totaled 82 points to finish a close third to conference rival Berlin. The Indians earned the second team qualifying spot with 74 points, with Watertown Luther Prep claiming the sectional title with 65 points.

Yetter earned her trip to the state meet by placing sixth overall in the field and earned the final individual qualifying spot by crossing the finish line 17 seconds ahead of seventh place Adeline Baird of Ripon.

Lydia Luce and Ruby Kuehn finished backto-back in 12th and 13th place to back Vetter's strong run, while Winneconne's scoring five was rounded out by Lauren Wiedemeier in 24th place and Madeline Anderson – the lone senior in Winneconne's top five finishers – in 27th place.

under Well #2. From there it is pulled to the water towers as they draw down—finally arriving clean and drinkable to village residents' taps.

"Projects like this don't happen very easily," said Brad Werner of McMahon, one of the village's point persons on the project. "Safe drinking water is important for everyone to provide a high quality of life. The magnitude of a project of this scale was significant, with a big financial impact for a community of this size – but it's an investment that will help the village prosper."

In total, the RO project came in at \$5.35 million dollars—just under budget. It is also only the third state-of-the-art RO system in Wisconsin.

Eric Voigt, of Midwest Contract Operations, who helps manage the daily operations of the system, indicates the switchover has gone very smoothly and residents are noticing a significant improvement in their water. He also indicates the system will serve Winneconne for the long term and will handle most any other contaminants that may require removal.

"We are a community of opportunity," added Village Administrator Logan Fuller, "and part of that is what we offer to our residents. This [the new RO System] is a key contribution in being able to grow and provide the best service to our community."

The project also included major electrical u grades to Well #2 and new emergency backup power.

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Butte des Morts Lions Bring Better Student Vision into Focus

This past month, certified vision screeners from the Butte des Morts Lions Club, utilizing a Welch Allyn Spot Vision Screener and in collaboration with Winneconne Community School District (WCSD) Nurse Jennifer Krause, BSN-RN-NCSN, recently screened a total of 803 Winneconne Elementary School students and 11 middle and high school students for potential visual impairment.

The screener is a handheld device that can detect vision issues in persons from 6 months of age through adulthood, and commonly used for community and school vision screenings. It uses lights and sounds to engage children and enhance cooperation and comfort.

Of the 814 students screened, 57 were referred on for further examination and potential corrective lenses.

The Butte des Morts Lions Club covers the cost of the \$7,500 screener and its maintenance, and has been screening WCSD children since 2015—also covering the expense of additional eye exams and glasses for students in need.

Last year, Lions Clubs across the country completed over 20,000 exams, with 2,434 students referred.

"We truly value the partnership between our school district and the Butte des Morts Lion's Club," said Nurse Krause. "It has truly made a significant impact on our students, and we appreciate all you do supporting them. We are grateful for your continued collaboration."



Patrolling the Beat

September September 1 – ASSIST

September 6 – RECKLESS DRIVER

An officer was notified by a Winnebago County deputy of a motorcycle traveling well over 100MPH that was headed towards the village. A search was made but the officer was unable to find the motorcycle.

September 6 – DRUGS

Officers responded to a report of a verbal disturbance between a male and female. The female stated she wanted the male removed from the property, along with his friend. There was no evidence the disagreement was physical. Dispatch informed the officers that the male had open cases through Winnebago County for bail jumping, as well as two drug related charges. The parties agreed to separate and the two males gathered their things. Con-

sent to search the property was given. Drug paraphernalia was found in the boyfriend's property. The female then gave consent to search the residence. Drug paraphernalia was found, some of which field tested positive for cocaine. The male was arrested and transported to jail without incident.

September 7 – SUSPICIOUS PERSON

An officer was dispatched to the report of a suspicious person walking on E. Main St. with what looked to be a gun slung over their back. An officer had recently spoken with the person in question, who was walking home with a pool cue in a case.

September 7 – ADVISE/MEDICAL

An officer was dispatched to assist an individual with signs of a recent stroke. The officer assisted in assessing the elderly male and helping him to a cot while waiting for the arrival of emergency medical personnel.

Child care training site acquired for Advocap program


Oshkosh Herald Community support agency Advocap has secured three acres of land on Jackson Street in Oshkosh to build a child care business startup facility that received funding from the city through its federal ARPA funds.

Amid the increasing demand for accessible child care options and ongoing staffing shortages, Advocap's incubator initiative is designed to empower low-income entrepreneurs to start their own in-home child care businesses.

Advocap will support child care entrepreneurs through its Business and Workforce Development Department, assisting with business plans, marketing, licensing, and training and development.

The city allocated \$217,660 to Advocap that will cover about 25% of construction costs. The project also received a grant from the U.S. Small Business Administration that also will go toward construction. The Oshkosh Area Community Foundation has provided funding to equip the incubator with essential appliances.

Advocap is working with a local engineering firm on the design of the building and will create a capital campaign for the

remaining project funding. The organization expects to break ground by mid-2025 with completion in early 2026.

Rental spaces will simulate an in-home child care environment, allowing participants to comply with care regulations while offering technical assistance and resources to succeed in their ventures as small business owners.

Each participant will have their own space within the incubator facility, according to Advocap's application to the city. The shared space will have separate incubators running their business independently and offer a flexible space to accommodate different age ranges and allow for new providers to move in when a business owner expands and moves out.

"With staffing shortages as one of the biggest hurdles for existing centers, we wanted to create a new path for aspiring child care providers," said Tanya Marcoe, Advocap executive director. "This incubator will do just that by helping individuals launch their own businesses while increasing child care availability in the community."

More than 60 individuals have expressed a desire to move their child care businesses into the incubator once it is operational.

Advocap is a private nonprofit dedicated to reducing poverty and promoting self-sufficiency in Winnebago, Fond du Lac and Green Lake counties. The organization's current workforce development programs includes skills enhancement and adult education programs that can access funding for child care, tuition and books.



may obtain a free photo ID for voting from the Division of Motor Vehicles.

the **lf voter is unable to sign the poll book due to disability, a poll worker may write the word "exempt."

If a voter is not registered to vote, they may register to vote at the polling place serving their residence if the voter provides proof residence. of Where ballots are distributed to voters, the initials of two inspectors must appear on the ballot. Upon being permitted to vote, the voter shall enter a voting booth or go to a machine and cast their ballot. The vote should not be cast in any manner other than specified here. Sample ballots or other materials to assist the voter in marking their ballot may be taken into the booth and copied. The sample ballot shall not be shown to anyone so as to reveal how the ballot is marked. A voter who is a parent or guardian may be accompanied by the voter's minor child or minor ward.

An election official may inform the voter of the proper manner for casting a vote but the official may not advise or indicate a particular voting choice.

Assistance for Voting A voter may select an individual to assist in casting their vote if the voter declares to the presiding official that they are unable to read, have difficulty reading, writing, or understanding English, or that due to disability are unable to cast their ballot. The selected individual rendering assistance may not be the voter's employer or an agent of that employer or an officer or agent of a labor organization which represents the voter.

Where Optical Scan Voting is Used

The voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall write in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote and fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to the write-in line. On referendum questions, the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall fill in the oval or connect the arrow next to "no" if opposed to the question. When using an electronic ballot marking

 device ("Automark," "ExpressVote," Clear Access or "ImageCast Evolution-ICE") to mark an optical scan ballot, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of his or her choice for each office for which he or she intends to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot. the voter shall type in the name of the person of his or her choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select "yes" if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select "no" if opposed to the question.

Where Touch Screen Voting is Used

The voter shall touch the screen or use the tactile pad to select the name of the candidate of their choice for each office for which they intend to vote. To vote for a person whose name does not appear on the ballot, the voter shall type in the name of the person of their choice in the space provided for a write-in vote. On referendum questions, the voter shall touch the screen at "yes"

if in favor of the question, or the voter shall touch the screen at "no" if opposed to the question.

After Voting the Ballot

The voter shall deposit the voted ballot in the ballot box or deliver the ballot to an inspector for deposit and shall leave the polling place promptly. Spoiling Ballots

If a voter spoils a paper or optical scan ballot, they shall return it to an election official who shall issue another ballot in its place, but not more than three ballots shall be issued to any one voter. If the ballot has not been initialed by two inspectors or is defective in any other way, the voter shall return it to the election official who shall issue a proper ballot in its place. The voter may spoil a touch screen ballot at the voting station before the ballot is cast.

Make that call

While it is perhaps obvious this column's topic is outdoor related, it sickens me to know that such people are out there in our state. Here are just a few excerpts from the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's office, Sheriff Ryan F. Waldschmidt on the recent killing and mistreatment of our whitetail deer pop-



ulation: Over the last two months, investigators from the Fond du Lac County Sheriff's Office and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources conducted hundreds of combined hours of investi-

gation into the alleged killing and mistreatment of whitetail deer and other wildlife in southeastern Fond du Lac, northern Washington, and northeastern Dodge Counties. The investigation identified a significant number and variety of criminal and non-criminal violations.

Investigators have reason to believe that well over 100 deer were shot and/or killed between late spring of 2023 and July of 2024. One adult female and three juvenile males were identified as the primary suspects of this investigation. These alleged crimes occurred in the 200 square mile region. Much of this activity occurred after dark. The suspects drove around with a spotlight shining the fields, and when a deer was identified, suspects would fire a rifle at the deer. If they believed a deer was shot, suspects would enter the field to identify the sex of the deer. Most of the deer found were left dead. However, the heads of some bucks were removed, particularly when the buck had large antlers. Other deer were wounded by gunshots but not killed. Many of these nighttime excursions involved shooting multiple deer in an outing.

Investigators determined these suspects would also drive around with the intent of striking deer in the roadway with their vehicle. In one incident, the deer survived being struck by their vehicle but was severely wounded. The juvenile suspects picked the deer up and placed it in the trunk of their vehicle while recording video and taking "selfies" of and with the deer. One of the videos showed the suspects holding the deer, still alive but clearly suffering, while walking around the inside of their home. The deer eventually died while in captivity. In addition to capturing and/or killing deer, investigators obtained evidence to believe these suspects also targeted and harassed other wildlife including geese, raccoons, possums, and turtles.

There is a very, very long laundry list of alleged criminal and civil DNR violations involved in this investigation. With hunting season upon us, citizens are reminded they can call or text to report suspected DNR violations to the DNR Violation Hotline at 1-800-847-9367. If the violation potentially endangers other humans or property, 911 should be called immediately.

When in doubt – make that call. Please.

"It's big because we have not been one of the top seeds so to get a win tonight against a team we are supposed to beat is good."

Ryf and the Wolves will be looking for that kind of start again when they host Bay Conference rival Xavier in a Level 2 playoff game on Friday. The Hawks beat Little Chute 21-14 last Friday.

Winneconne knocked off Xavier 37-19 during the regular season, rattling off 37 straight points after falling behind 7-0.

Schaffer and Bryce Jones combined for 286 yards rushing in that win.

"Obviously, momentum is a great thing for us and we want to bring that momentum into next week," Schaffer said. "We will be playing a better team so we want to go out and do what we have to do, but this will be a big part of our success (against Xavier)."


