Small Wonders Daycare Center to close after 30 years of service

A beloved childcare service in the Town of Winchester is set to close its doors at the end of the year. Small Wonders Daycare—owned and operated by Ed and Nanette Drews (sister and brother-in law)—has made the difficult decision to stop operating, due in large part to ongoing staffing challenges.

"This is one of the hardest decisions we've ever made," said Nanette, "we love our community and know it's a need, but staffing is just impossible to

Small Wonders first opened its doors to the greater Winchester/Larsen community in September 1993, owned initially by Curt and Vicki Sprenger. The Drews duo purchased it in May of 2000 (renaming it to Small Wonders Daycare), and operated it for another 24 years—creating countless memories with generations of families.

Ed and Nanette, in preparation for closure, cataloged the many families and children the childcare center served. In total, Small Wonders has touched the lives of 207 families and a remarkable 340 children, ranging in age from 6 weeks to 13 years.

"Small Wonders has been more than just a daycare," said Nanette. "It has been a nurturing space where children have grown, learned, and blossomed into remarkable young individuals. For over three decades, our dedicated staff has fostered an environment of warmth, creativity, and encouragement, guiding little hands and bright



The Irony of the Outdoorsman

Ducks Unlimited, Whitetails Unlimited, Delta Waterfowl, Pheasants Forever, the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation... the list goes on for just about every spe-

cies on the globe supporting out-doorsmen. Heck, you could even argue that the World Wildlife Fund in their own way help to propagate species for our enjoyment.

It's a weird dichot-

omy of assisting species and habitat that ultimately, we harvest or benefit from. I have made the argument that "what's good for ducks (and other species) is good for people," and I believe that's true. Ducks Unlimited and the monies from our federal waterfowl stamp are the biggest purchaser and protector of wetland habitat – great for ducks, but these wetlands host so many other species and act as the "kidneys of the land" filtering out impurities from runoff and creating clean water.

So, while these groups may target a certain species they also harvest, there is so much positive collateral good that the ends certainly justify the means.

One of the biggest concerns with the decrease in hunters and outdoors-people is the reduced money put into the system in the way of stamps, fees, and taxes collected on ammunition and gear. There is certainly interest in keeping our hunter numbers up.

For 2024 at least, there is some good news. We had an increase in deer hunters in Wisconsin. We've been losing numbers for the past few years and it's a welcomed development. The DNR also shared other data from the 9-day deer hunt in Wisconsin.

Preliminary figures show hunters registered 189,622 deer during the

2024-gun deer season, including 89,787 antlered and 99,835 antlerless deer. Compared to 2023, the gun season harvest total is up 5.2% statewide, with the antlered harvest up 3.6% and the antlerless harvest up 6.6%.

Since the opening of the bow and crossbow seasons, Wisconsin hunters have registered 289,361 deer. This harvest is 8.7% ahead from the same time last year.

Adams County in the Central Farmland Zone led the state with 12.4 deer registered per square mile. Vernon County led the Southern Farmland Zone with 7 deer registered per square mile. Adams County also led the Central Forest Zone registering 4.2 deer per square mile. Finally, Florence County led the Northern Forest Zone with 2.9 deer registered per square mile.

For our local area we saw double-digit increases from 2023 in Fond du Lac (up 10.0%), Outagamie (up 17.7%), Waupaca (up 15.1%), Waushara (up 29.3%), and Winnebago (up 21.9%).

I wanted to add a story along the lines of hunters assisting their quarry. A group of deer hunters were performing a deer drive near Triangle Farm Campground and three deer ran from the woods and fell through the ice on the Wolf River. After several calls to the DNR and the sheriff's department, the guys from the Boom Bay Volunteer Fire Department (BBFD) answered the call.

They set aside their time and put their talents and equipment into action and ran the BBFD airboat up the Wolf River and eventually got the deer out of the icy waters. Rescues like this obviously helped the deer, but also provide invaluable training for more real-world operations involving people in distress.

Hats off to Dave Vandenberg, Steve Wulgaert, Tim Martin, Chief Dave Platta and the rest of the Boom Bay crew. A shout out to the Boom Bay Bar and Grill who furnished all the airboat's gas as well.

I know I sleep a little better at night

knowing these guys are around and willing to trade their sleep for mine.

"A life is a life," commented Chief Platta. "We were just happy to be able to an-

swer the call."

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






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

Winneconne wrestling squad hopes to learn from loss

It may not have been the result Winneconne wrestling coach Boone Roycraft would have wanted for the Wolves first dual meet of the season, but it was a starting point and gave the youthful squad something to build on.

Winneconne posted only one contested win against a potent Weyauwega-Fremont squad - a returning Division 3 team state qualifier from last season - and was saddled with a 67-9 loss in its season-opening dual meet, but Roycraft believes that brighter days lie ahead for his youthful squad.

"I knew going in this was going to be a tough dual meet for us, but I think it's good for the freshmen to get pushed into that right away and see what high school wrestling is all about," Roycraft said after the dual meet. "Obviously, I want to win now, but the biggest thing is just getting better. I care more about February than I do right now."

Winneconne had four freshmen in its lineup for the dual meet and were missing some key wrestlers due to injury and the extended football season.

However, two of those four freshmen accounted for all of Winneconne's points as Ryden Jezwinski earned a forfeit at 106 pounds and Brady Marks earned a wild 19-13 victory in the 138-pound match.

Marks was on his back multiple times and trailed 13-6 after the first period, but never gave up and scored a takedown and got four near-fall points in the final period to pull out the win.

"Just his attitude of not quitting was impressive. He was down in that match and never gave up," Roycraft said. "He's a tough freshman. I'm excited for him. I think he's going to be really good for

Although Winneconne didn't post any other wins, Roycraft liked being able to see what the wrestlers need to work on moving forward. He knows wins are going to be tough to come by, but he's excited to see how the matches

"It definitely gives you that opportunity (to see what you need to work on)," Roycraft said. "You learn more from your losses than you do from wins. I saw a lot of things where guys were making minor mistakes and it's costing us matches and that's what we have to fix."

The Wolves' opening lineup looked much different than the one Winneconne took the regional tournament last spring. Only three wrestlers from that tournament - juniors James Barone, JJ Mavroff and Carson Piotraschke - wrestled against the Warhawks.

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One of the wrestlers the Wolves did expect to return was senior two-time state qualifier Chase Sternard, lost for the season due to an injury.

Roycraft does expect juniors Trey Zemke, who qualified for the state tournament last season, and Bryce Jones, to be returning to action soon. Both were members of Winneconne's football team that reached the state semifinals.

"It's going to be beneficial to have that leadership back. They are in the room but it's a little bit harder to see that when they aren't able to do what the other kids are doing," Roycraft said. "Getting that leadership piece will be good for us because we are a younger team.

"Everything we do has got be purposeful - making sure we are doing the right things so at the end of the season we will be ready to go."

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
