Ahlana Saray has been hired as the new Village of Winneconne clerk, with her first official day falling on Election Day, April 1. Current Clerk Ann Wasinger will remain, however, to onboard Saray for a set period of time.

"It was good!" said Saray of her Election Day experience. "It was interesting to see the backside view of all of it and great training for me."

Saray, selected among a pool of over 80 candidates who applied for the village position, comes to Winneconne after being employed by Oshkosh Defense as a small business liaison officer. There, she managed over 100 Department of Defense contracts, developing contracting and subcontracting plans, handling in-person training initiatives, and also conducting national trade shows for the company.

Before that, Saray worked for KBX Logistics as a logistics team lead, primarily for the company Georgia Pacific.

Her education includes a BS from the University of Wisconsin Green Bay and a master's in public affairs from the University of Texas Rio Grande Valley—which spurred her desire to transition to the public sector.

One of the essential messages of Earth Day, "Every day is Earth Day", can certainly be witnessed in action at Winneconne Thrift & Gift.

In honor of Earth Day, April 22, Thrift mounted a display last week in homage to all things denim and its unique possibilities for being repurposed and recreated into many useful, desirable (and downright adorable) things. Behind Thrift's 'Jean Repurpose Project' are two longtime volunteers and talented sewers, Wendy Eagon and Becky Jahnke, who explained how Becky Janke and Wendy Eagon display some of their the effort was stitched together.



"I was looking on Pinterest and saw all these things you can do with discarded jeans," said Jahnke. "As a volunteer, I saw how much denim we were sending to be recycled, and I wanted to reduce that.

I began last fall creating some denim pumpkins, then at Christmas I did denim trees and it's sort of taken off from there."

In the US, an estimated 11.3 million ons of textile waste, or 85% of all tex tiles end up in landfills annually. That's about 85 pounds of discarded clothing per person, per year.

Rafter repairs and new roof coming this spring

The Winneconne Area Assistance Center (WAAC) executive board has known for some time that it needed to address problems with its existing roof and make repairs/replacements before even greater issues arose.

As of March 25, the board has selected contractor Rosenow Customs out of Neenah to complete a full roof replacement along with shoring up the main wood roof structure, which is bowing at the midspan of the rafters, showing significant distress on a structure that is roughly 125 years old.

Thrift for years after she saw the organization's incredible response to a neighbor's house fire.

"It's been so fun to make all this stuff. We've got purses, bags, pouches, baskets, pillows, placemats, aprons, trivets and more!" she said. "Nothing takes very long, and we incorporate fabric, buttons and stuffing from other donated items that can't be put on the sale floor to complete them. It's repurposing times two or three."

Eagon and Jahnke say they would love others to get involved in creating items for resale, and are even considering classes and make-and-take activities in the future to be hosted at the store.

Other clever repurposing efforts by members include recycling all metal, and the stripping of copper for non-saleable items; the cutting-up of white t-shirts with stains to create popular rags for sale, and even folding and reselling large garbage bags that donations are delivered in—at a great price, of course.

"A volunteer role can become so much bigger than you ever imagined," said Jahnke. "I really believe in the mission of Thrift and want to always have creative, interesting things here for our customers."

The Winneconne Area Assistance Center on 3rd St. – soon to receive a new roof.

Roof repair and replacement on the once Baptist Church on South 3rd St will come at an expense of \$62,999 as quoted by Rosenow, though if additional and unforeseen issues arise, the cost could escalate even higher.

Some of the work outlined by Rosenow includes:

• Removal and replacement of all shingles/metal fascia down to the deck.

• Re-secure any existing plywood sheeting and installing a synthetic underlayment on the balance of the roof surface.

• On the rear side of the bell tower, a commercial grade EPDM roofing membrane will be installed in the saddle areas.

• Installation of a water shield along the eaves and valley, and upslope from the saddle areas. • Install a new ridge vent, pipe boots and metal wall and chimney flashing.

• Mike James Builders will provide all necessary attic support and reinforcements as required by the project.

Pleased to secure a builder and roofing company with a willingness to take on this challenging project, WAAC still needs the

community's help managing this expense. Though maintaining a Building Fund for their property, the cost of the work is exorbitant.



Early Spring Lawn Care Agenda

As we advance through spring in Wisconsin, snow melts away to reveal lawns underneath. Once lawn areas are bare, the temptation is to get out and start working on them. There is a sequence to follow as spring advances for best results.

Lawns need to thaw out and dry out; it is best to stay off them until this occurs. As weather conditions allow, clean up debris such as leaves and sticks.

Lawns that had snow cover for con-

siderable time this winter often experience vole (or field mice) damage. This is visible in spring as winding trails on the lawn surface and small piles of grass. Raking lawns will remove all these types of loose surface materials but does not remove thatch. Thatch management calls for practices such as core aerating.

When to apply preemergence crabgrass herbicides, or crabgrass preventers, in a timely manner is a common question each spring. Tem-

peratures of soil, not air, need to warm to near 60 degrees and stay there for several consecutive days before crabgrass will germinate. This does not happen in March or April on Wisconsin lawns, so you have plenty of time before applying crabgrass preventers this spring. Early May is a good target for application for lawns where crabgrass has been problem in the past.

Fertilizer application timing is the other common lawn care decision of spring. As with crabgrass control, hurry up and wait. Lawns do not need fertilizer as soon as they thaw out. Idebanking in Wisconsin.



While it may be tempting to fertilize early to get lawns greener, excess nitrogen fertilizer in spring sets lawns up for multiple problems as the season progresses. Moderation in lawn nitrogen fertilizer applications is important.

Good things come to lawns when homeowners wait.

Sports Oleson's late goal lifts Wolves past Wildcats

Being on the road against a larger school, getting down a goal early isn't the best way for most teams to start a soccer match.

But when it happened to Winneconne on a sunny Saturday afternoon at Oshkosh West, the Wolves never seemed bothered.

Suri Hottmann headed in the tying goal to answer the Wildcats' early tally and freshman Abbie Oleson netted the game-winner with about 10 minutes to play as Winneconne collected the 2-1 nonconference victory.

'This team plays with a lot of heart and determination. They never give up," head coach Chris Guido said. "They got down quick, but they just kept fighting and we got the goal to equalize it and things then settled in more to our style."

Winneconne improved to 4-0 with the win but the victory over a traditionally strong Division 1 program will give the Wolves a little extra boost as it heads into its final East Central Conference season.

"It's a really great way to build our confidence for some of the better teams we are going to play later in the season," said Hottmann, a junior co-captain. "A big goal for us this season will be to beat Plymouth and beating Oshkosh West is a big first step toward that for us."


It was Hottman's goal that brought the match back to even after Oshkosh West had scored in the 11th minute to take the lead.

Hottmann, who nearly tied it a few minutes earlier on a shot from inside the penalty area which was saved, got on the end of a Brooklyn Messerschmidt corner kick and drilled a sharp header past the West goalkeeper and into the back of the net.

"It wasn't anything specific. It just kind of matched up," said Hottmann, who now has three goals on the season. "It felt really good, I'm not going to lie. To have a header is great."

Following Hottmann's tying goal, much of the game was played in the midfield with neither team generating many scoring chances.

Millie Braman, the lone senior or

the Wolves' roster, had a shot from distance late in the first half that was saved, while Hottmann had another scoring chance midway through the second half off a deflected cross, but her shot was sent right at the West netminder.

Winneconne's defense was also keeping West at bay. After the early goal, the Wildcats didn't generate much offense against the Messerschmidt-led back line.

Guido was pleased with the way his group defended West's attacking group and kept Winneconne in the game.

"We knew they had some girls with strong legs and if we limited their inside opportunities we would have a great chance," Guido said. "We knew if we could force them out wide, we could keep them at bay. We didn't allow a lot of shots which is a credit to the defense."

With less than 10 minutes to go, Oleson was able to take possession of the ball just outside the West penalty and carried it toward the Wildcat net.

Oleson found some space about 10 feet in front of the goal and drilled a low shot into the back of the net to give the Wolves their first lead of the game.

It was Oleson's team-leading sixth goal of the season.

"Abbie is a bulldog," Guido said. "She finds ways to slip through the defense and she's focused on that goal she has a nose for it. She will find a way to get it in there."

Sommers, who finished with five saves in goal for Winneconne, made one of her toughest saves on a shot from inside the penalty area about four minutes after Oleson's goal and then easily collected a shot from distance with a minute to play to preserve the win.

"For a young team, we take each game one at a time, but we are trying to build a strong, positive culture, it's a huge win." Guido said.

Wolves blast three home runs in win over Ripon

Three of the first four batters belted home runs as Winneconne scored five runs in the first inning enroute to an 11-1 win over Ripon in an East Central Conference game on Thursday.

Libby Jahnke led off with a solo home run, before Claire Schaffer followed with another solo blast. After Audra Schaffer drew a walk, Grace Mitchell delivered the third home run of the inning for a 4-0 lead.

Ripon scored one run in the bottom of the first to cut Winneconne's lead to 5-1 but the Wolves ended the game early with four runs in the fourth inning and two more in the fifth.




Winneconne made the most of four

Spring turkey season now open

By Matt Harp, Outdoor Reporter One of my favorite/least favorite hunt-



ing seasons is happening now. You see them all over the countryside and I see them regularly on my property, but actually getting a bead on one close enough is a matter of frustration for

me. I guess if it was easy, it wouldn't be fun.

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) reminds turkey hunters that the 2025 spring turkey season opens today, Wednesday, April 16.

The regular season is open through May 27, and all seven turkey management zones will be open for hunting during the spring season.

The 2025 season is comprised of six, seven-day periods running Wednesday through the following Tuesday. The season dates are as follows:

Youth Hunt – April 12–13 **Period A** – April 16–22 **Period B** – April 23–29 **Period C** – April 30–May 6 **Period D** – May 7–13 **Period E** – May 14–20 **Period F** – May 21–27 Hunters must bring their spring turkey license, wild turkey stamp and valid harvest authorization with them while hunting. They are encouraged to review the turkey hunting regulations before heading into the field.

Turkey harvest registration is mandatory and remains a critical component of turkey management in Wisconsin. Hunters must register their turkey by 5 p.m. the day after recovery, online or by phone at 844-426-3734. To register a turkey, hunters will need the harvest authorization number found on their paper or electronic harvest authorization.

In addition to public land open to hunting, the public also has access to thousands of acres of private land through the Turkey Hunting Access Program and the Voluntary Public Access-Habitat Incentive Program. Hunters can find these lesser-known properties and other public land hunting opportunities using the DNR's Public Access Lands online mapping tool.

Camouflage carefully. Hunter camouflage is an important part of hunting turkey, but it may also present a problem. The better camouflaged and concealed a hunter is, the more likely they are to be mistaken for a turkey.

It is especially important to avoid wearing red, white or blue. If a fellow hunter sees a flash of those colors through the brush, they could mistake that for a turkey. The youth turkey hunt was last weekend, and I saw some impressive birds taken. Also, there are some bonus tags available for other periods if you were unsuccessful during your initially assigned one.

NOTICE OF BOARD OF REVIEW MEETING TWO -HOUR MEETING

The Board of Review will meet on the 13th day of May, 2025 at 1:30 p.m. at the Winneconne Town Hall, 6494 County Road M, Winneconne for the purpose of calling the Board of Review into session during the forty-five-day period beginning on the 4th Monday of April, pursuant to Wis. Stats. §70.47(1).

Pursuant to Wis. Stats. §70.47(2):

After the first meeting of the Board of Review and before the Board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the Board of Review may contact or provide information to a member of the Board about that person's objection except at a session of the Board.

The Board of Review may not hear an objection to the amount or valuation of property unless, at least 48 hours before the Board's first scheduled meeting, the objector provides to the Board's clerk written or oral notice of an intent to file an objection, except that upon a showing of good cause and the submission of a written objection, the Board shall waive that requirement during the first 2 hours of the Board's first scheduled meeting, and the Board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session is less than 5 days with proof of extraordinary circumstances for failure to meet the 48-hour notice requirement and failure to appear before the Board of Review during the first 2 hours of the first scheduled meeting.

Objections to the amount or valuation of property shall first be made in writing and filed with the clerk of the Board of Review within the first 2 hours of the Board's first scheduled meeting, except that, upon evidence of extraordinary circumstances, the Board may waive that requirement up to the end of the 5th day of the session or up to the end of the final day of the session is less than 5 days. The Board may require objections to the amount or valuation of property to be submitted on forms approved by the Department of Revenue, and the Board shall require that any forms include stated valuations of the property in questions. Persons who own land and improvements to that land may object to the aggregate valuation of that land and improvements to that land, but no person who owns land and improvements to that land may object only to the valuation of that land.

No person may be allowed in any action or proceedings to question the amount or valuation of property unless the written objection has been filed and that person in good faith presented evidence to the Board in support of the objections and made full disclosure before the Board, under oath, of all of that person's property liable to assessment in the district and the value of that property. The requirement that objections be in writing may be waved by express action of the Board.

When appearing before the Board, the person shall specify, in writing, the person's estimate of the value of the land and of the improvements that are the subject of the person's objection and specify that information that the person used to arrive at that estimate.

No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone, or object to a valuation if that valuation was made by the assessor or the objector using the income method of valuation, unless the person supplies the assessor with all the information about income and expenses, as specified in the Assessor's Manual under Wis. Stats. §73.03 (2a) that the assessor requests. The Town of Winneconne has an ordinance for the confidentiality of information about income and expenses that is provided to the assessor under this paragraph that provides exceptions for persons using information in the discharge of duties imposed by law or the duties of their officer or by order of a court. The information that is provided under this paragraph, unless a court determined that it is inaccurate, is not subject to the right of inspection and copying under Wis. Stats. HYPERLINK "http://nxt.legis.state.wi.us/link.asp?stats/19.35(2)" \t "_top" §19.35 (1).

The Board shall hear upon oath, by telephone, all ill or disabled persons who present to the Board a letter from a physician, surgeon or osteopath that confirms their illness or disability. No other person may testify by telephone unless the Board, in its discretion, has determined to grant a property owner's or their representative's request to testify under oath by telephone or written statement.

No person may appear before the Board of Review, testify to the Board by telephone or contest the amount of any assessment unless, at least 48 hours before the first meeting of the Board or at least 48 hours before the objection is heard if the objection is allowed under Wis. Stats. §70.47 (3) (a), that person provides to the clerk of the Board of Review notice as to whether the person will ask for removal under Wis. Stats. §70.47 (6m) (a) and if so, which member will be removed and the person's reasonable estimate of the length of time that the hearing will take.

No person shall be allowed to appear before the Board of Review, to testify to the Board by telephone or to contest the amount of any assessment if the person has refused a reasonable written request by certified mail of the assessor to enter onto the property to conduct an exterior view of the real property being assessed.

2 cups all-purpose flour 2 tsp. baking soda 1/2 tsp. table salt 2 tsp. ground cinnamon 3 large eggs 2 cups granulated sugar 3/4 cup vegetable oil 3/4 cup buttermilk 2 tsp. vanilla extract 2 cups grated carrot 1 (8-oz.) can crushed pineapple, drained 3 1/2 oz. flaked coconut 1 cup chopped pecans or walnuts **Buttermilk Glaze:** 1 cup sugar 1 1/2 teaspoons baking soda 1/2 cup buttermilk 1/2 cup butter or margarine 1 tablespoon light corn syrup 1 teaspoon vanilla extract Cream Cheese Frosting: 1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened 11 ounces cream cheese, softened (about a block and a half)

1 (16-ounce) package powdered sugar

1 1/2 teaspoons vanilla extract

Preheat oven to 350°F. Line 3 (9inch) round cake pans with parchment paper; lightly grease and flour parchment paper. Set pans aside. Make the buttermilk glaze: combine the sugar, baking soda, buttermilk, butter, and light corn syrup to a boil in a large Dutch oven over medium-high heat. Boil, stirring often, for 4 minutes. Remove from heat, and stir in vanilla.

Stir together flour, baking soda, salt, and cinnamon. Beat eggs, sugar, vegetable oil, buttermilk, and vanilla extract at medium speed with an electric mixer until smooth.

Add flour mixture, beating at low speed until blended. Fold in carrot, crushed pineapple, coconut, and pecans or walnuts. Pour batter into prepared cake pans. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes or until a wooden pick inserted in the center comes out clean. Drizzle buttermilk glaze evenly over layers; cool in pans on wire racks 15 minutes. Remove from pans and cool completely. Make the cream cheese frosting: beat butter and cream cheese at medium speed with an electric mixer until creamy. Add powdered sugar and vanilla extract; beat at high speed 10 seconds or until smooth. Evenly spread the frosting on the tops of the cakes. Stack the layers on top of each other and frost the sides.


