

of course, cake.

"She loves it all," said her daughter, "and we told her she could have anything she wanted. She was thrilled."

Arriving remarkably sharp and fit to the age of 100 (her actual birthday was April 7), Millie's personal story has been preserved in the Winchester

Area Historical Society's recent book, "It Takes Strong Women." Her history is shared with love and admiration by her eldest daughter Janis "Matty" Mathison and Janis' siblings:

Mildred "Millie" Mathison was one of 10 children born to Charles Thorson and Sadie (Reier) Thorson, and the first to be born in a hospital. Charles suffered severely from complications with arthritis and as a result, Sadie and her children, along with hired hands and sometimes hobos, all pitched in to keep the family's Town of Clayton farm going – developing in Millie traits of frugalness, tenacity and a Norwegian spirit she's retained all her life.

Millie attended Lonely Oaks School for eight years, walking a mile and a half each day to and from the oneroom schoolhouse.

When her father died in 1936, her mother moved Millie and her three younger siblings to Winchester, leaving Millie's brother, Willis, to run the farm. The move to Winchester required her to leave Neenah High and attend her senior year at Winneconne - becoming the first person in her family to graduate from there.

Millie remembers, "When I was a senior at Winneconne, they had a workstudy program where I was learning typing and shorthand, and I was offered a job at Larsen Cooperative. Later I worked there for several years."

Millie and her future husband, Nor-

# Spring election brings people to the polls

Wisconsin Supreme Court race votes in Crawford

In the race for Wisconsin State Supreme Court, the contest was called

just over an hour after the polls closed on April Candidate Susan Crawford captured 1,301,128 (55%) of the votes to Brad Schimel's

1,063,244 go County's newly elected (45%) for the ultimate victory and 10-year

term on the state's largest court.

At least \$107 million was spent overall in the race — shattering the

previous national record set only two years ago in Wisconsin, according to WisPolitics. About \$24 million of that came via Elon Musk and related PACs, the tally showed. Dems had their rich

Crawford's victory retains a liberal majority on the court. A 4 to 3 edge was gained two years ago after 15 years with a conservative lean.

Schimel told those at his gathering the race was over and they needed to accept the outcome. "God bless you. God bless the State of Wisconsin," he

State Superintendent of Schools Incumbent candidate for State Superintendent of Schools Jill Underly captured 1,148,451(53%) statewide to Brittany Kinser's 1,022,350 (47%) for a closer statewide race, earning another 4-vear term.

During her speech, Underly touted

the highest graduation rates in state history, as well as higher standards in math and science, under her watch.

While officially a nonpartisan race, Kinser had the backing of many Republicans in Wisconsin and is a supporter of private school vouchers and the state's charter school program and has been critical of incumbent Jill Underly's decision to change standardized testing benchmarks and scoring thresholds for school district performance report cards last year.

#### Winnebago County Executive

Roughly 3,000 votes separated challenger Gordon Hintz and incumbent Jon Doemel in the race for Winnebago County Executive.

Hintz, the former Wisconsin Assembly Minority Leader, defeated Doemel in the spring election with 30,832 (53%) votes to Doemel's 27,374 (47%).

Doemel has served as county executive since 2021. Hintz's victory reinforced his strong showing in the primary earlier this year.

Hintz indicates his priority is working closely with local municipalities and to increase public engagement.

"Working with the towns, working with the cities, working with the villages, but also really engaging the public," he said. "We want to bring county government to the public."

Doemel, in a Facebook statement, said, "That's a wrap. We did amazing things over the last four years. Thank you for giving me some time to fix our county and get us back on track. It was never about me. It was about making government work for you."

As the kids grew up and left home, Millie and Norris kept busy with home projects, their cottage in Iola, traveling, and enjoying their grandchildren. Later, Millie took a class in rosemaling and became an instant natural and a true artist in the craft. Many in the area have some of her artwork.

Eventually the post office home became too big for them, and the couple moved to Ann St.— where her flower gardens, listening to the church carillons, trips to Frank & Darlene's, cards, Friday fish frys and Packers games served to keep them busy. Norris passed away on Dec. 13, 2008, which was also the couple's 65th wedding an-

Thanks to her faith and strong connection to her church, Millie has gone on to survive many health challenges-always returning to her beloved Henrietta Apartments—where she is still enjoying happy hours with her friends or beating her kids at a rousing game of cards.

One daughter remarked, "Mom is a true hero. Not the hero who rushes into a burning building to save people, but the kind of hero who each day exemplifies integrity, conviction, selflessness, determination, honesty, and faith."

A housemate at Henrietta added, "As soon as Millie wakes up, I hear her say, 'This is the day the Lord has made; I will rejoice and be glad in it.' Those words fill my heart as Millie recites them, and then lives by them."

open seats. Of the 1,555 votes cast, current Trustee Steve Foster received 511, while candidates Mary K. Krings captured 527 and Brian J. Miller 517, ostensibly earning two-year terms.

The six-vote split between Foster and Miller spurred Foster to request a recount, which the village conducted on April 4. The initial counts held, placing Krings and Miller on the board of trustees for the next three years.

#### **Town of Clayton**

Supervisor 1 Kay Lettau has retained her seat (857 votes) over challenger Terry Haase (729) for a total of 1,586 votes cast.

#### Town of Vinland

In the Town of Vinland, the Supervisor 2 position, incumbent Mike Mc-Namee retained his seat, earning 404 votes, while challenger Bob Marquart captured 363, with 767 votes cast.


#### Winneconne Community School **District School Board**

Winneconne Community School District Board of Education's race had three candidates for two seats.

Challenger Katie Calewarts captured the most votes at 2,389; Mark Kunde the second most at 2,340, and Meghan Keller, who declared in her candidate statement she would not accept the seat if elected, 2,227. Calewarts and Kunde will serve three-year terms for WCSD.

#### **Voter ID**

Wisconsin's photo ID requirement for voting will be elevated from state law to a constitutional amendment under a proposal approved by voters. Sixty-three percent of voters were in favor of the measure, while 37 percent were opposed.

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# Vex Robotics teams shine at state tournament

The Winneconne VEX Robotics Club sent 14 teams to the State VEX Robotics tournament held in March at the Resch Expo Center, Green Bay. The club was represented by seven elementary and six middle school teams, along with one high school group.

The high school team, Tech-No-Logic (Owyn Zanto, Nathanial Bunck, Will Nigl, and Isak Zanto), had one of their best days, posting their highest skills ranking of the year. The team placed 9th in skills and earned an invite to the VEX Robotics High School World Championships, held in Dallas, Texas May 6-8. This is the first high school team in the club's history to achieve this goal.

At the middle school level, Team N-Squared (Marty Derginer, Nolan Keller, Henry Newton, and Hayden Sall), made it to the finals in a best of three fashion. They too were able to post a very high skills ranking, coming in second and earning an invite to the VEX Robotics Middle School World Championships in Dallas May 9-11. The group also received the day's "Think Award".

For other middle school teams, Lucky Duckies (Evelyn Gende, Abigail Barnes, Paige Leaedtke, and Zoe Skadahl), received the Sportsmanship Award. In other special recognitions, Aces (Max Fischer, Evelyn Herman, Adelynn Hudack, and Carson Reese), and the Swooping Falcons (Alexis Doughty, Farron Carter, Eli Lauerman, Jory Bastian ) received honors.

At the elementary VEX IQ level, the event is all about collaboration as teams align and go for the highest

combined score. Winneconne's teams went out and showed the state their P.A.W. principles and what it means to follow the Winneconne WAY, and at the end of the day also brought home some awards.

Team Light-Bots ning (Spencer Fischer, Charlie Houlihan, Blake Jentz, Bryson Reese, and Jordan Schmeling) was awarded one of Judges the Awards, and of the day

## The Weekly Whisk

#### **Garlic Parmesan Roasted Carrots**

With Easter right around the corner, I thought I would share a delicious, flavor-packed way of roasting carrots. I always suggest using whole carrots instead of the baby carrots you get in a bag. They have so much more flavor. When slicing the carrots, try to keep them as uniform as possible so they cook evenly. Keep an eye on them while they are roasting, times may vary and you don't want them overcooked.

- 2 pounds carrots, washed, peeled, and diagonally cut into 3-inch pieces
- 4 tablespoons butter
- 4 cloves garlic
- 1 teaspoon Italian Seasoning
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 1/3 grated parmesan cheese
- 1/4 cup chopped fresh parsley

Preheat oven to 425°F. Grease a rimmed baking sheet with cooking spray or line it with foil and set aside.

Place prepared carrots in a large mixing bowl; set aside. Melt the butter in the microwave. Once melted, add minced garlic, Italian Seasoning, salt, and pepper to the melted butter and whisk until thoroughly combined. Pour the butter mixture over the carrots and toss to coat. Add in the grated parmesan cheese and mix until combined.

Transfer carrots to the baking sheet and arrange them in a single layer. Bake for 20 to 25 minutes or until tender. Mix them around halfway through cooking. Remove from oven. Sprinkle with fresh parsley and serve.

During this election we had a total of 126 write-ins. We had to sort through every ballot to secure them, so the total matched the printout. After we found them, they needed to be recorded as to what the vote was intended for.

Out of 126 ballots, only THREE votes were for a registered write-in, the rest were local names, Elvis Presley, Mickey Mouse, John Lennon, etc. You get the picture.

If you do not like the candidate, just leave it blank. Please.

So, two hours after closing, we were finally at a point where our totals matched. People, there were still other steps to take to finalize the election; we do not need your sense of humor added to our work.

Poll workers are all paid positions, even though this is mainly a civic duty. We did not want to extend our time to make more money, we wanted to do our job and go home. The next time you go out to vote, take the workers into consideration and don't fool around with your ballot.

This is the last election for 2025, so you might need reminding again in February or April.

It is an honor to work with my fellow poll workers. When we were busy, we were all busy. When it was slow, it was a joy to spend time with them. A thank you goes out to our Clerk of Courts; she has been a great help in training us to do our jobs. She was there whenever help was needed, always with a smile on her face. And finally, a shout out to the Fin 'n' Feather for furnishing our sandwich meals for the last six elections. It was delicious and we were grateful.

Next year's elections will be seeking more poll workers to help. If this is something you are interested in, go down to the Municipal Center and get signed up. An email will be sent regarding training dates.

I'll be looking forward to the 2026

election season—minus the write-in shenanigans.

Not for a second. In a world full of chaos, change, and dysfunction, there's Dan pulling up to the boat ramp in April again.


Once again, all is in order and right with the world.

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# Patrolling the Beat

February, 2025

**February 2** – SUSPICIOUS SITUATION

Officers made contact with the female resident, who stated she had a verbal disagreement with her husband. She stated nothing physical had taken place and her husband was not at home. An officer responded to an address on Birch St. after being notified of a female complaining of abdominal pain and shortness of breath. Contact was made with the female. First Responders and EMS took over care, who was ultimately transported to Aurora for further treatment.

#### **February 13** – ASSIST AGENCY

An officer assisted with a traffic stop which resulted from observing the driver cross the solid yellow line twice. The driver performed field sobriety tests and when asked about medications, admitted to being on a fentanyl patch. No illegal drugs were found following a vehicle search. The driver was transported to Oshkosh, where they were picked up by a friend. No further action was taken.

#### February 26 – ORDINANCE


Dispatch notified an officer of an illegal dumping complaint on W. Main St. Employees reported that an unknown person had placed several items in their recycling dumpster without permission.

# Winneconne golfers look to be strong again

With three players returning from last season's state qualifying team, Winneconne should be set to once again be a powerhouse in the WIAA Division 2 field.

Except this season, the Wolves will be competing at the Division 1 level when the postseason tournament series starts.

After qualifying for the last three state tournaments - and finishing no worse than third in any of the trio of trips – Winneconne was bounced up a division because of WIAA's competitive balance plan implemented before the 2024-25 school year.

It was a move Wolves head coach Chris Peters has known about since last June and said that his team will hit the links and do its best against whatever competition it goes up against.

"Golf is a game of constant adjustment and 'playing the ball as it lies.' This is our lie," Peters commented. "We will play to the best of our abilities and demonstrate how strong of a program we have in Winneconne - regardless of division."

Winneconne will compete in the East Central Conference one final year before moving to the Bay Conference next season and will aim to challenge for the title once again after finishing second last season.

However, its in the regionals and

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sectionals where the move will be felt as the Wolves - who have qualified for state in six of the last eight seasons will face a changed route and new opponents in order to earn a trip to University Ridge in early June.

"We are excited to see how we stack up," Peters commented. "It's unfortunate since we believe we are one of the top Division 2 teams in the state and have proven we can compete with any of them. Now we are starting over in showing who we are."

Winneconne does bring back a strong nucleus from last year's squad with three returning golfers who earned all-ECC honors in juniors Austin Dobbe and Parker Groff along with sophomore Brody Peppler.

Dobbe and Groff were the Wolves top two individual finishers on last year's state team that finished third in the Division 2 field. Dobbe finished tied for 14th in the weather-shortened event held at Blackwolf Run, while Groff placed 22nd overall.

That trio will be joined by sophomores Sully Ramthun, Jackson Larson and Sawyer Krueger who will be vying for the final two spots in the varsity ro-

It's a group that Peters has confidence in entering the season and believes the team will shine against an amped up schedule before the postseason starts.


"We should compete for the final

ECC championship ... (and) we are hosting regionals and can compete for a regional championship," Peters commented. "We will be participating in several events that are Division 1 heavy and we will have a very good idea of where we fit prior to the tournament series."

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

Winneconne boys claim title at ECC indoor meet

Winneconne put on an impressive show in claiming the team title at the East Central Conference indoor meet, more than doubling the point total of second place finisher last Friday at the Willmore Center in Ripon.

Schaffer posted his wins in the 200 meters and the long jump. In the 200 meters, Koltyn Kachur followed Schaffer in second place.

The Wolves also posted a 1-2 finish in the pole vault with Trey Zemke winning the event and Silas Sarbo taking second.

Grant Wenzelow in the 800 meters, Colten Tisler in the high jump and Hudson Samolinski in the shot put also won their events for Winneconne, while Wenzelow in the 1,600 meters and Kachur in the 60-meter hurdles each earned second places.

The Wolves also picked up sec-

ond-place finishes in two of the three relays. The foursome of Hawthorne, Jovan Zeller, Joseph Hutchison and Plotz took second in the 800-meter relay, while Zeller, Meyer, Nettekorn and Quigley were second in the 1,600-meter relay.

Carlee Hart and Ruby Kuehn each won events and placed in multiple events to lead the Winneconne girls, who were fourth among the seven teams. Hart finished first in the pole vault. Kuehn posted her win in the 800 meters, while taking third in the 1,600 meters.

The Wolves had a top finisher in the 3,200 meters with Lauren Weidemeier taking second.
