As the sun shone brightly and the temperature rose to a balmy 85 degrees on the afternoon of May 12, the staff at Winneconne Middle School officially cut the ribbon on the building's new playground - part of the \$28 million-dollar comprehensive renovation of the school, which continues through the summer of 2025.

Principal Todd Schroeder, before releasing the entire sixth-grade class to experience its delights for the first time said, "You are a special class, because you get to live through all the construction, but you also get to experience all the good things of a completely new school during your seventh and eighthgrade years. Part of it is our wonderful new playground area, including volleyball, basketball, and tennis courts. We appreciate this from our community and from our Miron workers. It's so awesome!"

Miron Senior Project Manager Ben Samolinski told the News that the playground is focused on creating an interactive and inclusive experience, both for the school and the community's use.

'The concept was to create a playground that could be enjoyed not just by middle school students but by elementary and high school students as well. It was created with community use in mind," he said. "Dr. Larson felt the taxpayers supported this and wanted everyone to feel welcomed to enjoy it."

The spaces are available for public use when not in use by students, the district informed the News, typically from 8 to 11:30 a.m and then again after 1 p.m., as well as during evenings and weekends. There may be occasional times when physical education classes are using the courts, and community use must pause until classes end.

In addition to several pieces of muti-use playground components, including a "ninja warrior" type course and two large banks of swings on a rubberized surface to help prevent injuries, the expanded play area includes two new basketball, refurbished tennis/pickleball, and brand-new volleyball courts.

In an effort to provide an extra layer of protection for those using the fishing piers adjacent to the Winneconne Bridge, Police Chief Ben Sauriol applied for a grant to add flotation throw rings on both piers and enlisted the expertise of the Wolf River Resorts for a top-of-the-line recommendation before purchasing.

"Last year, someone jumped in the

water to save a dog that fell off a boat," said Chief Sauriol. "We decided that having throw rings on both piers was the best way to spend some safety grant money. Accidents can happen at any time and given the number of boats on our river and people who frequent the piers, having throw rings will enhance the safety for everyone."


important lessons in project management and to take responsibility for a significant accomplishment.

On Wednesday, the Wolves finished 12 shots ahead of Kettle Moraine Lutheran and Kewaskum at Hon-E-Kor, with a pair of Winneconne golfers tying for medalist honors.

Parker Groff and Brady Peppler bested the field, each shooting a 35, while teammate Sully Ramthun tied for third, one shot back with a 36. Austin Dobbe and Sawyer Krueger each carded rounds of 39 to complete the lineup.

Krueger earned medalist honors at the mini-meet on Friday, firing a 35 at Quit Qui Oc to pace the Wolves' vic-

Dobbe and Groff were among a group of five golfers who finished one shot behind Krueger, while Peppler

Winneconne's score of 145 was six shots ahead of Plymouth and 10 ahead of Kewaskum.

Winneconne finished the mini-meet season first in conference with 10 total points. Kettle Moraine Lutheran is in second place with 16 points followed by Plymouth with 24.

The Winneconne Historical Society members are looking forward to opening their museum buildings for tours at Marble Park starting on Sunday, May 25. All six buildings will be open from noon to 4 p.m., continuing every Sunday through Labor Day weekend. The buildings will also open for two Saturdays during Sovereign State Days weekend (July 17-20) and the Winneconne Car Show (Aug. 2).

Visit the area's original train depot, once located along the Wolf River; the Little Country House that was the infirmary for the Children's Country

Home; the "visitors' favorite" oneroom schoolhouse; the Kay Wilde Doll Cottage; the Steamboat House, which contains the cabins from the riverboat Leander Choate II; and the newest addition to the complex, a replica of the bridgetender's house that sat on the drawbridge over the Wolf River before the bridge was torn down.

Each building contains extraordinary memorabilia. There is no charge to tour, but donations are appreciated as the society is a non-profit organization.

Town of Winneconne Board addresses vacancies

At its recent board meeting on May 15, the Town of Winneconne addressed several vacancies affecting local operations, including the immediate need to fill the position of highway superintendent/road commissioner.

Dave Black, who had served in the role since January 2023, has resigned due to personal reasons. In the interim, Clerk Yvonne Zobel has assumed the responsibilities, but town officials emphasized the urgency of appointing a replacement, with spring being a particularly busy time.

The highway superintendent oversees essential infrastructure duties, including managing road construction projects, supervising maintenance and repairs, ensuring compliance with safety and environmental regulations, and coordinating with contractors and engineers. The role offers a stipend of \$25 per hour for services rendered in a part-time capacity.

While the board may move to formally post the position, interested individuals are encouraged to inquire directly at the Winneconne Town Hall or contact Clerk Zobel at (920) 582-

3260

The board also addressed additional resignations affecting the Town's Plan Commission. Black, who also served on the seven-member advisory board, stepped down alongside two others who had vacated their seats earlier. This leaves three positions unfilled.

The Plan Commission helps guide the town's short- and long-term growth strategies. Responsibilities include reviewing development proposals, drafting and amending zoning and subdivision ordinances, and consulting with residents on land use plans. Commissioners receive a \$50 per-meeting per diem

In other business, the board discussed the future of the town's squad car. With the recent transition to contracted law enforcement services from the Winnebago County Sheriff's Department, the town no longer actively uses the vehicle. However, a sale would require voter approval. Town officials indicated it may be prudent to wait until the first year of the sheriff's contract concludes before deciding whether to sell.

Brighten Landscapes with annual flowers

Looking to add plants with abundant color to your landscape, deck, or balcony with minimal effort? Annual flowers are a fantastic way to do so and are readily available at garden center outlets throughout Wisconsin now.

Annuals, as the name implies, live just one growing season. The knock on them is they need to be replanted each year, as compared to perennials that return each season. Major benefits of annuals, however, include providing extended periods of color throughout the season, and allowing gardeners flexibility by changing color schemes each year. Furthermore, annuals are prime choices for containers and hanging baskets.

For impressive results, match annuals to the specific conditions present on the site. Available light is a major factor; many require full sun, yet others are adapted to shade. Among the annuals for shade locations are begonia, browallia, coleus, torenia, and impatiens. Certainly, the list for sun areas is extensive. Numerous cultivars are available among the different species to make a wide variety of color combi-

Consider the size of the plants to ensure they are good fits for both the specific spot and overall landscape plan. Having well-prepared soil is especially important, and good soil drainage is essential. Prepare soil to depths of 6 to 8 inches before planting, adding organic matter such as compost, peat moss, or composted manure. Work in balanced garden fertilizer (for example 5-10-5 or 10-10-10) at a rate of 1 to 2 pounds of fertilizer per one hundred square feet of planting area. For window boxes and patio containers, use quality potting mixes, typically containing perlite and organic matter, rather than field soil.

sunflower, and tall zinnias.

Regular care throughout the season is important to keep your display of annual flowers colorful. Water as needed to keep plants healthy, keeping in mind soil in hanging baskets and containers dries out faster than landscape beds



and gardens. Fertilize plantings once or twice during the season. Hanging baskets benefit from more frequent, lighter fertilizer amounts throughout the summer.

Pinching back and deadheading are two key maintenance practices for annuals. Pinching back developing plants will lead to more compact growth; carefully cut (or pinch) tips back to side shoots. Deadheading involves removing faded flowers after blooming, so plants spend energy producing more flowers rather than seeds.



After the first meeting of the Board of Review and before the Board's final adjournment, no person who is scheduled to appear before the Board of Review may contact, or provide information to, a member of the Board about the person's objection except at a session of the Board.
